RANKED-CHOICE VOTING (RCV) IS A DISASTER

- Decreased voter confidence in election processes
- Less ability for voters to understand the different candidates
- Makes ballots more complicated
- More complicated for election workers
- Encourages fringe candidates
- RCV is a slow process and relies on technology that many voters don't trust

Oregon State Legislature House Bill 2004

Sponsored by only Democrats, Ranked Choice Voting will be on the ballot for Oregon in November of 2024. If the bill passes, it will switch all of Oregon to a new way of casting and tallying votes.

What's In The Bill?

- ALL elections would need to be tabulated at the state level.
- If no candidate is over 50%, the candidate with the lowest rank is removed.
- Votes are transferred from the removed candidate to each ballot's next highest ranked candidate. That means a ballot now has two votes for a single candidate.
- A new round of tallying begins, repeating these steps.
- The process is so convoluted for offices with multiple seats, it can't even be summarized. (See HB 2004 Sec 4 Par 3)

GOAL: BACK TO HAND COUNTING!

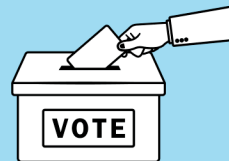
ORS254.485 Tally of ballots; test of vote tally system; rules.

(1) Ballots may be tallied by a vote tally system or by a counting board. A counting board may tally ballots at the precinct or in the office of the county clerk.

Best Election Processes:

1. Register in person with valid ID
2. Vote with paper ballots at local precinct
3. Limited absentee ballots
4. Hand count by trained volunteers with observers
5. Final precinct tally delivered to county

BATTLEGROUND OREGON

(PORTLAND, OREGON) JULY 28, 2023 - The battle for election integrity continues for Thielman v. Fagan as the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals has agreed to expedite the appeal of the Secretary of State dismissal of the case.

Thielman v. Fagan asserts that the people have been locked out of Oregon's unsecured mail-in elections. The right of the people to audit our own elections is a right protected by the first and 14th Amendments, and no government can engage in conduct that undermines voter confidence in our elections.
